
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A Purr-fect Place to Get in From the Cold: New Cat Cafe in Ann Arbor



Keep Indoor Cats Warm During Winter Months

Even indoor cats can get chilled during cold winter months, especially in homes that dial down the thermostat to conserve energy during the day. Make sure that kitty has cozy places to keep warm, which is especially important for older kitties and those with stiff joints or arthritis. Consider:

Heated cat beds

Some heated cat beds are semi-enclosed and others are round with raised sides or flat like a heating pad. Choose a style based on your cat's regular bedding style. For safety, choose a bed that only heats up when in use, and returns to room temperature when the cat steps off. Look for a bed with a removable cover for easy cleaning.



Window perches

If your cat likes to sit on the window sill, likely drafts can make this uncomfortable in winter. Place a padded window perch on the sill which could be a plush towel or piece of blanket or fleece. You can also find heated window perches.

Sunny windows

Look for places around the house that get the most sunlight. Place a chair or cat tree near windows where sun is the strongest. Be sure to leave curtains open.

Well-placed litter boxes

Some homes might have litter boxes in the basement or garage, both of which can get cold for kitty. This can be especially uncomfortable for older kitties or ones that do not handle the cold well. Instead, move litter boxes into the house.

Cozy living

Cats should never be confined to the garaged or basement, not even just for sleeping. A cold, damp environment is not only uncomfortable for your kitty, but is also unhealthy.

Brushing is Best Thing You Can Do for Cat's Teeth

By age 3, many cats already show signs of dental disease. In cats, dental disease affects a cat's gums (gingivitis) and causes plaque build up on the teeth, which, if not removed, leads to serious periodontal disease affecting structures that support the teeth.

Delaying dental care can cause serious health problems including:

- Loose and infected teeth
- Abscesses and throat infections
- Kidney, liver and heart damage

In honor of National Pet Dental Health Month (February), The Cat Practice is offering a \$200 discount off all dental treatments now through the end of February 2017. Giving your cat a thorough dental exam and cleaning is a great way to start the new year!

During dental treatments, cats are sedated while their vital signs are closely monitored. Fluids are given to keep kidneys functioning during the procedure. Sedation enables your veterinarian to:

- Take dental x-rays to look for diseased tooth roots. (60% of dental disease is found below the gum line.
- Thoroughly clean your cat's teeth above and below the gum line.
- Examine the oral cavity for changes, sore areas, swelling or masses.
- Perform any necessary extractions. .
- Polish teeth to smooth out surfaces.

PRIOR to a dental procedure:

Before a dental procedure, make sure your cat is healthy enough for general anesthesia.

- Routine blood work checks organ function and rules out illness.
- An echocardiogram rules out an underlying heart condition. (Especially important if your cat has a heart murmur).

Breed Profile: Dilute Mixed Breeds

Mixed breed cats have body types, coats and color patterns similar to a specific breed, but are not purebreds. A cat may resemble / have traits of a Persian cat, but without a genealogy, would be a "mixed breed" or "Persian mix" and so on.



A mixed breed cat is "dilute" when the color of the coat is less intense. For example, cream or tan is the dilute version of red. Beige or fawn is the dilute version of cinnamon.

Mixed breed cats make wonderful pets and the dilute variation makes for a lovely coat. The varied genetic make-up can minimize health concerns that may be dominant in a purebred. If you have a dilute mixed breed cat, watch out for dental disease (all cats) as well as possible allergies, skin conditions and skin cancers.
