June is Adopt a Shelter Cat Month

Consider Adopting a Homeless Kitty

Cat overpopulation in S.E. Michigan means there are many homeless cats and kittens looking for good homes at the area's numerous rescue groups and shelters. If you are looking for a new feline friend, consider:



Oakland Pet Adoption Center, 1700 Brown Rd., Auburn Hills. www.oakgov.com/petadoption. While OPAC tries to place as many cats and kittens as possible, it's often faced with overcrowding.

Pet Finder, www.petfinder.com which features kitties up for adoption from a variety of rescues and shelters. The site also allows you to search by cat breed.

For an easy transition for your new shelter kitty, follow these tips:

- Have your new kitty checked by your veterinarian before coming home. It's common for shelter kitties to have a case of the sniffles that other kitties at home could pick up. It's easily treated with antibiotics or immune boosters.
- Make sure that your kitty has been tested for BOTH feline leukemia (FeLV) and FIV before placing them with other cats.
- Set aside a room or area for your new kitty to get used to your home. This allows resident pets to adjust to someone new while allowing the new kitty to check things out slowly.
- Never force interactions between the new kitty and current residents. Let them meet slowly and on their own terms. Create positive associations with treats or toys.
- See if kitty likes new foods and remember, canned is better than dry! Feeding the same shelter food is not necessary unless it's a prescription diet for a medical problem.

Keep Kitty Safe This Summer by Avoiding These Seasonal Hazards

Hot weather means increased risk of mosquito bites, dehydration and getting into garden plants. Watch out for these hazards to keep kitty safe this summer.

- Outdoors: You might be tempted to let your cat outside in the warm weather. You risk your cat fighting with other cats/wildlife, or getting hit by a car. If you want to take your cat outside, keep him/her on a leash closely supervised.
- Antifreeze: Many car owners change their vehicle's antifreeze / water mixture. Antifreeze, which tastes sweet to pets, is highly toxic and can be fatal if consumed.



- **Sunburn:** Even cats can get sunburned, especially white or light-colored ones. Sunburn can cause serious skin problems so avoid leaving kitty outside too long, especially in the intense afternoon sun.
- Barbeques and picnics: Many leftovers can cause gastrointestinal upset, vomiting and diarrhea. In particular, cats do not have the enzymes to digest dairy-based products such as mayonnaise. Also spoilage can cause food poisoning.

Fireworks caution: Loud noises / explosions can be stressful even for indoor pets. In preparation, consider using anxiety remedies such as **Bach Flower Essences** (Rescue Remedy), Feliway or pheromone collars . If your cat spends any time outside, bring him/her inside before fireworks start. Also watch for fireworks debris which can be toxic if consumed.

Breed Profile: Mixed Breed Cat

Instead of showcasing a purebred, we want to talk about the mixed breed kitties we all know and love!

Mixed breed cats date back to the Egyptian Pharaohs and perhaps before. Early cats tended to be



somewhat uniform within a geographic area, but these became mixed as cats on sea-trading vessels often abandoned ship, joining the local feline population. Cats survived witch hunts of the 1500s and 1600s, though their numbers severely dwindled. As people realized that cats were valuable in curtailing rat populations and were good companion animals, their numbers grew and they were allowed to breed randomly.

Mixed breed cats come in any color combination with short, medium or long hair. Personality may be based more on environment than ancestry. There is a "Household Pet" class in cat shows, and all mixed breeds are accepted; the only requirement is that the cat is well-cared for and content, and must be spayed or neutered.

Preparing to Take Kitty on a Road Trip

More families are taking pets on vacation with them. If your next road trip includes your kitty, follow these tips for a safe and happy feline!

- Use a properly-sized carrier. Bigger is better with room for kitty to stand, turn and lay down. Hard-sided carriers are safer/more durable.
- Protect against accidents. Place several layers of disposable diaper pads in the bottom of the carrier to soak up accidents. Keep plastic bags handy for disposal. Some cats get car sick so withhold food for a few hours before leaving. Offer food and water only at rest stops. Freeze a bowl of water for kitty to lick to avoid spills.



- Put a litter box on the floor. Do NOT let kitty out of the carrier while the vehicle is moving or when doors are opened. When stopped, let kitty stretch and use the litter box.
- Prepare for finicky eaters. Bring your cat's regular food, plus favorite meals or treats.
- Organize medications. If your cat is on medication, pack supplies in a sturdy cooler bag. Use a daily pill organizer to make dosing easy.

Keep veterinarian's contact info handy.

If your Kitty Will Be Boarding

If kitty will be staying behind and boarding while you are on vacation, make sure that:

- Kitty is current on vaccines (at least 10 days prior to boarding).
- You bring any special foods in a labeled container with kitty's name on it. Also make a note of any foods that your kitty cannot eat.
- You bring any medications that your kitty may be on in a labeled container.
- You let the boarding facility know if your kitty has been sneezing or has any other health problems.
