Keep Kitty and Other Pets Safe This Thanksgiving

Every Thanksgiving veterinary emergency hospitals see an increase in the number of patients. Keep your kitty out of the ER this holiday by avoiding these common Thanksgiving hazards.

Food

- Feed kitty turkey only in small quantities; overfeeding can cause vomiting.
- Be sure to remove any bones that can cause intestinal obstructions and severe internal damage.
- Hide grapes and raisins which are toxic to cats (and dogs), and can cause kidney problems.
- Store away onions and garlic which can cause anemia.

Decorations

- Never leave candles unattended.
- Put away ribbon and string that can become entangled in your feline's intestines if they eat it.

Anti-Freeze Bill Stalling in State Legislature

Michigan Bill #29, which would require companies to add a bitter-tasting additive to automotive anti-freeze, passed the Senate and is now in front of the House Regulatory Reform Committee. The bitter additive would make it less likely that cats, dogs and children would be drawn to the otherwise sweet-tasting liquid which can be fatal if ingested.

In the Meantime, Keep Anti-Freeze Out of Reach

- Keep pets out of the garage and away from motor vehicles that can leak antifreeze.
- If adding antifreeze, immediately clean up any spills.
- Store antifreeze where pets and children can't reach it.
- Watch for **signs of antifreeze poisoning** which include: Drunken appearance (staggering, loss of coordination, and disorientation); excessive thirst; excessive urination; vomiting; listlessness; depression; seizures and coma.

November is American Diabetes Month

Feline Diabetes is on the Rise; How to Spot Symptoms

Just like in humans, diabetes is also being seen more frequently in cats, especially as they age. The good news is that with early detection, diabetes can be easily treated and managed.

Symptoms

- Excessive drinking
- Increased urination – more/more frequent
- Increased appetite
- Weight loss
- Vomiting and/or diarrhea

Treatment

Your veterinarian may recommend a diet change and/or insulin injections.

Prevention

Keep kitty a healthy weight! Being overweight for long periods of time is the number one factor leading to feline diabetes.

Human-Quality Diagnostics Catch Signs of Serious Illness Early

Today, cats are living 20 years and more. As cats age, they face many of the same health issues as humans, including arthritis, diabetes, heart disease and cancer. **Human-quality diagnostics** – like ultrasound and echocardiogram – are making **EARLY DETECTION** of such health conditions easier – and easier to treat.

A cat is considered senior at age 10. If you have a senior cat, work with your veterinarian to be on the lookout for early signs of health conditions that can become serious if left untreated.

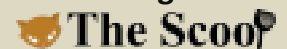
