Spring Means Allergies for Many Cats

In cats, spring allergies often appear as they do in humans: with a sneezy, runny nose and watery eyes, as well as itching, over-grooming and hair loss. If you notice these symptoms in your cat, you may have a seasonal allergy sufferer! Although there is no "cure," for allergies there are many treatment options.

What you can do at home:

- Use air-conditioning instead of opening windows or use an air filter system.
- Keep kitty inside while the lawn is being mowed.
- Minimize the number of houseplants in the home. (Avoid toxic plants. See the list at <http://www.aspc.org/pet-care/poison-control/17-common-poisonous-plants.aspx>.)
- Leave shoes and jackets at the door to minimize allergen spread.

How your veterinarian can help:

- If symptoms persist, ask your vet about treatment alternatives.
- Your vet might suggest allergy testing to identify what your cat is allergic to.

Although every breed of cat can have seasonal allergies, some breeds like Devon Rex, Orange Tabbies and Calicos are most allergy prone.

Flea and tick prevention

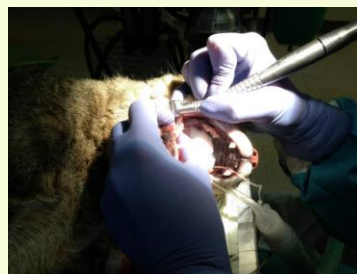

April is National Pet First Aid Awareness Month

Be Prepared with a Feline First Aid Kit

Quick thinking and basic first aid items can reduce the severity of some injuries and even save your pet's life. Put together a basic first aid kit in a plastic container. Include:

- A list of 24-hour emergency clinics close to home
- Number for the ASPCA poison control center **(888) 426-4435**
- Copy of your cat's most recent medical records
- Clean towels to wrap your cat in or to compress a wound
- Benadryl to be given ONLY as directed by a veterinarian over the phone
- Non-latex gloves
- A flashlight and magnifying glass to inspect for parasites or small wounds
- Tweezers for removal of small splinters and ticks
- Sterile eye-wash solution for cleaning out small, shallow cuts
- Non-adherent padding such as Telfa pads for bandaging minor wounds
- Antibiotic ointment to apply to small wounds
- Hot packs that can be activated and wrapped in towels to keep kitty warm

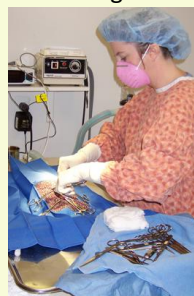

What to Watch for After Spay/Neuter Surgery

Dr. Houlihan says that all procedures should include pain management to make sure pets are comfortable following surgery. Families should carefully observe their pet for two weeks following any type of surgical procedure to watch for signs of discomfort or changes in the pet's behavior that could signal problems or reactions to the procedure. In addition, prior to any procedure, Dr. Houlihan recommends that pet owners ask lots of questions of their veterinarian to make sure that pets are properly monitored and that necessary precautions are taken.

Why celebrate a slimy mass of barfed up fur? The real intent is to raise awareness about hairballs and their potential danger in causing intestinal blockages in your pet. How to prevent them?

- Regularly comb and brush kitty to remove excess fur.
- Use an over-the-counter hairball remedy twice weekly.
- Mix extra fiber, like canned pumpkin, into kitty's food.

Breed Profile: Orange cats



Orange cats (also known as ginger or marmalade) are not a specific breed, but a color that extends through multiple purebreds and mixed breeds. All orange cats have tabby markings; some lighter than others. There's no such thing as a solid orange cat. The dilute version is cream or buff. Most orange cats are male, though females are not unheard of. Orange cats are usually outgoing and friendly. They

tend to have more health issues than many other colors, including a tendency to develop allergies, dental disease and heart disease.
