Pet Adoption Offers Many Advantages Over Buying

If you are thinking about a new cat or other pet, consider adopting over buying from a pet store or breeder. Adoption offers many advantages:

- So many people are amazed at the affection and gratitude shown by adopted pets; they understand that they have been brought into a loving home.
- Adoption staff can usually provide information on each pet's distinct personality and behaviors.
- Pets put up for adoption have been screened for health and behavior issues.



Added note: Although kittens and puppies are cute and fun to watch, adopting an adult with a developed personality can be the best decision you've ever made!

BUYING FROM A BREEDER: If you decide to buy from a breeder -- there are many reputable ones -- but remember to ALWAYS visit where the kittens or puppies were raised and ask for a tour to check on conditions of the facility and how pets were treated.

Check the Health of Your Newly Adopted Kitty

It's not uncommon for cats coming into a new environment to become stressed and show signs of illness. Runny noses and watery eyes can be common in cats coming from shelters. Fortunately, these symptoms typically signal nothing more than a common cold.

How can you make sure that you new kitty is healthy?

- Make sure that the adoption facility provides paperwork with dates of:
 - FVRCP (distemper), rabies and feline leukemia vaccines
 - Deworming
 - Feline Leukemia (FELV) and FIV tests
- Schedule an immediate appointment with your regular veterinarian who will provide a more thorough exam than a shelter. Be sure to bring the above paperwork!



How to Introduce a New Cat Into Your Home

Bringing home a new cat – or any pet – can change the dynamic with any existing pets. If you have other pets – and are bringing home a new kitty, follow a few steps to make the transition easier for them – and for you!

- A slow, controlled introduction gives your new kitty the best possible chance of becoming part of a happy, balanced family.
- Choose a room for the new kitty to be alone and become acquainted with your home. Provide a new litter box, new bed and mix of new toys and toys used by your other pets so that new kitty becomes familiar with their scent.

Experts predict tick population explosion in 2013

According to *Veterinary Practice News*, tick populations in many areas are likely to explode this year due to warmer winters, suburbanization, an increase in white-tail deer and migratory bird populations. Be sure to talk to your veterinarian about flea and tick protection for your pets.

Plan Now for July 4 Fireworks

While July 4 is a fun time for families, the noise of fireworks and firecrackers can absolutely terrify cats and other pets. Start planning now to create safe places for your kitty.



- Provide a sheltered space for kitty by covering a table with a long table cloth or lining a cardboard box with a favorite blanket.
- Use Feliway (a simulated cat pheromone) to help reduce the stress caused by loud noises. (Available in both a diffuser and as a spray.)
- If your community has fireworks in close proximity to your home, consider boarding your cat. Be sure to tour the boarding facility to see how cats are cared for before boarding Fluffy!

Michigan Bill Advancing to Add Bitter Agent to Anti-Freeze

According to the American Animal Hospital Association, sweet-tasting antifreeze may not be tempting to pets and kids much longer as legislation to add a bittering agent to the formula is continuing to advance through Michigan government. The Senate passed [Senate Bill 0029](#) - referred to as the "engine cooling bittering agent act" - nearly unanimously. The bill will now move on to the House. SB0029 gives manufacturers a deadline of January 1, 2015, to add bittering agent, denatonium benzoate, to their engine coolant products. It would then be illegal to sell any non-bitter engine coolant products in Michigan. Senator Steve Bieda, bill sponsor, said the legislation will help prevent the pain that people experience when their children or pets are poisoned by engine coolant. "Every year hundreds of children and thousands of animals are harmed by ingesting antifreeze mistakenly," said Bieda on [his website](#). "We can prevent serious injury to children and family pets by taking the simple step of making antifreeze bitter so that it loses its appeal."

A Cat's Not Just a Cat!

Breed Profile: African Shorthair (Sokoke)



These rare, independent, spirited cats are active athletes requiring a lot of vertical space for climbing and acrobatics. Although these beautiful cats can adapt to life in a smaller home, they would do best with access to an outdoor enclosure for climbing and mental stimulation. Unlike many other cat breeds they also like to swim!

African Shorthairs are generally sociable towards other cats and dogs. Their natural intelligence, coupled with their social attitudes make them great candidates for people who like to train cats. Generally healthy, the Sokoke usually only requires regular brushing and veterinary visits, just like any cat!

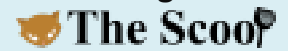
