### Study Says Many Pet Parents Fail to Spot Pet Obesity

Research by the Association for Pet Obesity Prevention says many pet owners don't recognize obesity in their pets. Out of 1,421 animals assessed in fall 2014, **57.6 percent of cats** and 52.6 percent of dogs were classified as obese, while pet parents considered these pets to be of normal weight. **Cats that are overweight are at risk of:** 

- <u>Arthritis</u>. All cats eventually have some arthritic changes as they age, but being overweight can cause it to happen sooner and be more painful.
- <u>Diabetes</u>. One of the most common diseases in cats is diabetes. Cats who have been overweight for long periods of time are at higher risk.
- Hepatic lipidosis (fatty liver disease). This happens when an overweight cat loses weight quickly as a result of untreated diabetes, hyperthyroidism or diminished appetite from another illness -- and can be serious.

### How to tell if your cat is overweight:

- 1. Feel the ribs. You should be able to feel your cat's ribs using SLIGHT pressure.
- 2. Look at your cat from above. You should be able to see a discernible waist line. If there is no curve, your cat is likely too heavy.
- 3. Look at your cat from the side. You should see an abdominal "tuck," meaning the abdomen should tuck up to the hips. If there is no tuck or the fat pad hangs low, the cat is likely overweight.

### Avoid Kitty Heat Stress During the Cat Days of Summer



Warm weather and summer fun can also signal potential risk to your feline. Keep kitty safe with these tips for the "cat days" of summer.

**Keep kitty well-hydrated.** Get your cat to drink more by swapping out cute little ceramic water bowls for much larger dog bowls. Some cats hate having their whiskers touch the sides of the bowl! Use ice cubes as summer toys to slide across floors and to get cats to lick extra water.

**No air-conditioning?** Air-conditioning is best on very humid days. If you don't have AC, use fans to keep air circulating. Wet a washcloth with cool water and run it over kitty to cool him or her off.

**Shave long-haired cats.** Consider shaving your long-haired cat's coat shorter during summer months.

If you suspect your cat may be overweight, or want to prevent overeating, talk to your veterinarian or veterinary nurse about your cat's diet and nutrition.

### Make Home Safer for Pets With Fire Safety Tips

Each year, 40,000 pets are killed in fires; most of them residential. In a fire, it's essential to get pets out quickly and safely. Follow these tips:

- Locate your pet's hiding places. During a fire, pets are terrified and run to places they feel safe. Find the best cubbyholes, map them out on paper, and include the map in your escape plan.
- Prepare an emergency kit for each pet. Include your pet's food, vet records, medications and photo. If boarding your pet until you're settled, the facility will need proof of vaccines.
- Know your escape route. Keep carriers (or collars and leashes for dogs) . near doors that you use most frequently in case you have to evacuate or if firefighters need to rescue your pet.
- Affix a pet alert window decal. Record the number of pets inside your house on a pet alert decal and affix to a front window in easy view of emergency responders. Keep number of pets updated. Get free window decals at <u>www.adt.com/pets</u>, <u>www.akc.org</u> and <u>www.aspca.org</u>.
- Consider monitored smoke detectors. Pets left alone can't escape a burning house. Monitored smoke detectors connect to and send a signal to an emergency response center.
- Give pets a way out. During a fire, if you can't find your pets, leave an outside door open and call your pet's name once outside. With luck, he or she will hear you and head for your voice.

### A Cat's Not Just a Cat! Breed Profile: Maine Coon

One of the oldest natural breeds in North America, the Maine Coon is regarded as a native of Maine and is the official Maine state cat. It's believed that the breed originated from shorthaired domestic cats and longhairs introduced by New England seamen or brought to America by Vikings. While Maine Coons are highly peopleoriented, they are not overly-dependent. They do not constantly seek attention, but prefer to "hang out" with their human, investigating whatever activities are going on and "helping" when they can.



The Maine Coon's semi-longhair glossy coat is heavy and waterresistant, and comes in nearly all colors and patterns; the most common is brown classic or mackerel tabby. At maturity, males can average 13-18 pounds and females 9-13 pounds.

I use what I think is a plant hanger that I got at a resale shop. The bag slips right over the tip of the hanger's arm.
