Take Care of Stray Cats in Cold Weather



Winter is always a tough time of year for strays and homeless cats. If cats are friendly, they may be someone's pet who has gotten lost or has been abandoned by the owners. In this case, check for collar tags or consider taking the cat to a veterinarian or shelter to see if they are micro-chipped.

On the other hand, if a cat appears to be skittish and afraid of humans, it may be best to provide care outside. For feral cat caretakers, help your colonies survive the cold winter months with these tips:

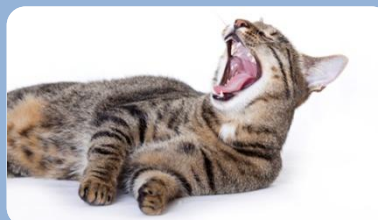
- Provide a shelter made of wood or plastic. Elevate it off the ground to protect against moisture; line the inside with newspapers.
- Keep shelters small to maximize body heat; use multiple shelters for large colonies.
- Use straw for insulation and bedding. Avoid blankets, which absorb moisture.
- Remove snow from entrances and exits so cats don't get snowed in.
- Avoid snow-melting salt and chemicals since they can be toxic if ingested.
- Feed canned food in insulated containers since it takes less energy to digest than dry food.
- Provide fresh water continuously to prevent dehydration.

Be a Calming Influence to Your Cat During Vet Visits

A trip to the vet can mean anxiety for a lot of cats. This can lead to fewer exams and increased risk of undetected illness and disease. In addition, avoiding the vet only makes nervous felines even more anxious when they do see the vet.



An anxious cat can start with an anxious cat owner! When a cat senses its owner's apprehension, the cat becomes MORE anxious - a vicious cycle! Follow these pointers to become a calming influence to your cat during his or her next vet visit.

- 1. Watch your behavior.**
While well intended, some human behaviors can increase your cat's anxiety. Clutching your cat, talking loudly, staring in your cat's face and invading his or her personal space can all raise your cat's anxiety level. In addition, human sounds -- intended to soothe or quiet (like "shhh") mimic the hissing sound of another cat and can also add to the stress.
- 2. Avoid reprimanding your cat.**
Tapping on your cat's head or using a stern voice may startle the cat and provoke a fight-or-flight response. Cats are not humans and react differently to discipline. Instead, reinforce positive behavior and ignore negative behavior rather than trying to correct it.
- 3. Determine if your presence helps or hinders.**
The Cat Practice usually encourages owners to remain with their cats for blood draws, but if you become anxious during such a procedure, it may be best not to be present. A spike in the owner's anxiety can cause kitty to become more fearful.
- 4. Understand cat vocalization.**
Recognize that vocalization, such as hissing, growling or yelping, is normal when a cat experiences fear. It does not mean that your cat is being hurt or mishandled. Cats use vocalization as a means of expressing themselves, which is healthy and normal.

Dental disease can be present in cats that are only several years old and, if left untreated, can lead to serious illness including heart disease, kidney disease and more.

Sneezes & Sniffles Can Signal Winter Colds

Just like in humans, dry winter air and seasonal viruses can make your cat's nose run and eyes water. Kitties get colds too, but it's important to make sure that a common cold doesn't turn into something more serious.

Be on the lookout for: sneezing, coughing, runny eyes and / or nose, congestion and lack of appetite. Viral infections usually just need to run their course, but a secondary bacterial infection may require antibiotics and other supportive care.

Contact your vet if your kitty is:

- Congested with yellow or green eye or nose discharge.
- Not acting or eating normally.

Monitor at home if:

- Your kitty is eating and acting normally.
- Discharge from eyes or nose is clear.

A Cat's Not Just a Cat!

Breed Profile: Savannah



The Savannah has an exotic look unlike any other breed.

The first known Savannah was born April 7, 1986 when a female domestic cat gave birth to a kitten sired by an African Serval, a medium-sized African wild cat native to sub-Saharan Africa. This unusual female kitten, with domestic and Serval-like traits, was named "Savannah" along with the breed. The Savannah was accepted for Championship status by TICA in 2012.

Most Savannahs are the size of a large domestic cat. Their coat usually has a distinct spotted coat pattern.

The Savannah is an active cat who needs daily interaction, either with its human family or with a companion cat. It is also a very loyal cat who will bond strongly with its human family, but is not a lap cat and will show affection on its own terms. Many Savannahs love to play in water. They can easily be trained to walk on a leash with a harness, and most love to play games such as fetch.

Cat's Meow Tip: Manage Litter Box Misses

Our cats have a tendency to back right up to the edge of the litter box. Occasionally, urine spray goes outside the box and leaks underneath to the floor. We now place the litter box on an adult Depend-style bed liner. Any spray is absorbed by the liner and prevents it from seeping under to the floor. The liner can be changed when necessary and saves a lot of additional cleaning.
