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Black Widow Spiders in Michigan; Bite Can be Fatal to Cats

Black Widow spiders live in all states except Alaska. In Michigan, the Northern Black Widow can be found anywhere in the state. The spiders often live around buildings and can be found outside or inside. They often inhabit corners and nooks and crannies where cats like to play.

Cats that are bitten by a Black Widow often face a poor prognosis unless they get immediate treatment after a bite. Young and older cats, as well as those with high blood pressure, face increased risk.

A Black Widow bite can be difficult to diagnose. Symptoms can be serious and include:

- Paralysis
- Abdominal rigidity
- Severe muscle pain in the back, chest and abdomen
- Howling and loud vocalizations
- Muscle tremors and cramping
- Trouble breathing
- Increased blood pressure and heart rate
- Inability to stand
- Excessive salivation and restlessness
- Vomiting (possibly containing the spider)
- Diarrhea
- Death, if anti-venom is not given quickly

If you suspect that your cat has been bitten, get him or her to the veterinarian immediately. Your vet will want to do a complete blood profile, urinalysis and physical exam. If possible, take a sample of your cat's stool and / or vomit which will help your vet make a quicker diagnosis.

The Brown Recluse spider is also a threat to cats and their bite can be fatal. While they are not as common as Black Widows, the Brown Recluse can also be found in Michigan.

Increase Kitties' Comfort as They Age

Today, cats are living 20 years and more. And just like humans, as they age, cats face the same physical changes.

Cats are considered "[senior](#)" by age 9 and "[geriatric](#)" by age 14. If you have a cat who is approaching his or her "golden years," consider how you can make life more comfortable while keeping kitty active.

- Place litter boxes on all levels of the home for easy access.
- Provide stools / stairs to help cats get up onto their favorite spots.
- Brush / comb them often to prevent matting in hard to reach areas.
- Give joint supplements like Glucosamine and Chondroitin to help support healthy joints.



Watch for Signs of Arthritis Pain in Your Cat

Closely observe your older kitty for signs of arthritis pain, which might include:

- Hesitation before jumping
- Licking joints
- Difficulty grooming
- Intolerance for being picked up
- Taking longer to get up after a nap or difficulty finding a comfortable position

If you notice any of the above, see your veterinarian who might prescribe pain medications to make your kitty more comfortable. NEVER give your cat human pain medications.

Fish Flavored Cat Food May be a Factor in Feline Hyperthyroidism

A new study in Japan-- as reported on by the American Animal Hospital Association -- suggests that cats that eat a lot of cat food containing fish may be more prone to hyperthyroidism. (See full story at <http://www.aaha.org/>)



The possible link may be the amount of environmental pollutants that cats are exposed to as a result of diets high in fish content. Researchers are not sure. There's a lot of good research looking at pet nutrition these days, but it's important to note that research is ongoing and oftentimes, studies contradict each other.

So in the mean time, moderation is key. Find the flavors that your cat(s) like and give them a variety!

Signs of Feline Hyperthyroidism:

Watch for these signs of hyperthyroidism in your cat. If you observe any one of them, contact your veterinarian.

- A voracious appetite
- Weight loss
- Increased drinking and urination
- Hyperactivity
