Ticks on rise in Michigan

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Lone Star Tick Putting Cats at Risk in Michigan & Across U.S.

The Lone Star Tick, which used to be found mostly in southeastern and south-central states, now has increasing prevalence in many states including Michigan, and as far north as Maine and as far west as central Texas and Oklahoma. It carries many diseases, both viral and bacterial, that are transmitted into your cat's blood stream and can be fatal. They can also be contagious to humans and other pets.



Ticks attach themselves to the skin and feed on an animal's blood. They are visible to the human eye and often attach themselves in and around the ears and neck. **Symptoms in cats include** fever, bleeding, poor appetite and low platelet count. Tick bites can lead to anemia and affect a cat's immune, lymphatic and nervous systems. If you notice any of these symptoms, or have spotted a tick on your cat, contact your veterinarian.

Removing a tick from your cat

Wearing gloves, use fine-tipped tweezers, to firmly grasp the tick's head. Pull it straight out and avoid spreading bacteria by not crushing or squeezing the tick's body. Place the tick into a jar of insecticide or rubbing alcohol. Inspect and clean the bite area with an antiseptic. Check it regularly for irritation and monitor your cat closely.

The best prevention is to keep cats INSIDE. Also

treat your cat with a flea and tick-preventative recommended by your veterinarian. See more on

July is National Anti-Boredom Month

Make Sure Kitty Stays Active and Stimulated

National Anti-Boredom Month started with humans in mind, but can also pertain to kitties. Cats that become bored, and lack activity, can act out with bad behavior or just become depressed.

Cats need **mental stimulation and physical activity** to stay alert and enjoy good quality of life. Try to incorporate AT LEAST ONE of these activities into your kitty's daily routine.

- Play fetch. Cats can be taught to retrieve objects and bring them to you just like dogs. Toy mice and soft rubbery small balls (look for them in the cat toy aisle) are both great.
- Walk your cat on a leash. Test out the harness at home before going outside.
- Use laser pointers made for cats.
- Put treats or dry food morsels in a toy. (While a mostly canned-food diet is recommended for cats, treats, and dry food as a treat, are fine.)
- Teach your cat to do tricks!
- Enrich your cat's home environment. Create vertical spaces with cat trees or cat shelves. Add cat tunnels and cardboard boxes for hiding places.

Bee & Wasp Stings Can be Serious for Many Kitties

Certainly if your kitty goes outdoors, he or she is at much greater risk of being stung by a bee, wasp or hornet, but indoor cats are equally as vulnerable if venomous insects get in through open windows or doors.



For many cats, being stung can mean swelling and tenderness at the site of the sting. But for some cats, who are allergic to the venom, a sting can be fatal if not immediately treated.

Whether your cat has mild swelling or a more serious anaphylactic reaction, it's important to seek IMMEDIATE veterinary treatment.

Signs that your cat may have been stung

- Localized pain
- Swelling
- Vocalization / crying

PUT AN ICE PACK ON THE AREA TO HELP REDUCE PAIN UNTIL YOU GET TO THE VETERINARIAN. For a mild reaction, your kitty may just need an injection of Benadryl. **NEVER GIVE YOUR CAT HUMAN BENADRYL.**

An allergic reaction could be life threatening to your cat.

Early signs of anaphylactic shock include:

- Vomiting/diarrhea
- Urination or defecation
- Itchiness/hives
- Swollen muzzle / tongue
- Weakness
- Weak pulse
- Lethargy
- Cold limbs
- Drooling
- Changes in behavior
- Elevated heart rate
- Pale gums/mucous membranes
- Collapse
- Shallow/rapid/difficult breathing



Bites in throat can be fatal

Cats love to catch flying insects and can easily swallow a bee or wasp. If you suspect this may have happened, GET VETERINARY HELP IMMEDIATELY. Not doing so can be fatal. Your cat's throat will swell quickly and he or she will suffocate. On the way to vet, place a small ice cube in your cat's mouth to help reduce swelling.

The Cornish Rex is distinguished by its curly coat, large ears and sleek, curved body. But underneath all this sophisticated elegance is a playful cat known for kitten-like antics.

Cornish Rex cats are playful, affectionate, highly intelligent and love interaction. They need lots of space and plenty of attention. Don't let this breed get bored – that's asking for trouble!

Though they appear to be fragile, the Cornish Rex is a sturdy, generally healthy breed.
